How do you communicate with your community (newsletter, newspapers, public meetings, email, social media, website, etc.)?

During 2023 the Tidy Towns Chair and Treasurer have actively used social media to promote work being undertaken, future plans, information of use to the WHOLE community and to engage with residents, businesses and visitors.

The Tidy Towns Treasurer has also used personal time to create a community Tidy Towns website, providing users with Tidy Towns information & news, handy gardening tips & advice and access to the Tidy Towns Community Improvement Plan (clearly showing work completed and tasks profiled).

However, we recognise that not all Strokestown residents are comfortable using IT, emails and/or social media. To reach this important community audience we provide regular information updates to our Parish newsletter and promote events by means of posters in local shops, An Post, hotel, filling station and Health Centre.

At the time of completing this Tidy Towns Competition entry the Treasurer is working closely with the Strokestown Head Librarian to arrange for access to their in-Library TV systems, with the aim of communicating Tidy Towns information to further community members.





How do you engage with your local schools, youth clubs, etc.? How do you involve youth in your work, do you have a Junior TidyTowns, is there youth representation on your committee?

The Chair and Treasurer continue to engage closely with our local Primary and Secondary schools, with student support being an essential part of ongoing work to clear, develop and maintain the Cloonslanor Burial Ground/former workhouse, helping with community planting and undertaking Litter Picking events.

With specific regard to a 'Junior' Tidy Towns, we have recently been approached by two younger members of the Strokestown community asking if such a group could be created. This level of youth interaction is heart-warming and we are presently exploring the logistics of how we, as an Executive Committee, can take this forward.

Briefly identify ONE specific project where particular effort was applied since June 1st, 2022. (This can include ongoing maintenance work or new project) Amongst a number of projects that we have completed since June 1st, 2022 the one that made the greatest 'whole Community' impact would be our Christmas Tractor Run (Tractor Run 2022). After months of planning this formed part of the annual Town Christmas Market and was supported by entrants from across multiple counties. As part of a fund-raising and awareness-raising event over 40 adult-driven tractors (illuminated with Christmas lights) lit up a circuit of Strokestown and neighbouring Townlands. In conjunction we also ran a 'Junior' Tractor Run enabling local children to illuminate their go-karts and mini-tractors – this attracted a great turn-out. Organisation of a 2023 event is already happening!!

Approximately how many years has your community entered the competition? How has your community benefited from involvement in the competition? As stated in our opening welcome, Strokestown has been an active participant in the Tidy Towns competition for over 50 years.

From a 'benefit' perspective we do not consider it hyperbole to recognise the importance of the Tidy Towns competition to Strokestown during difficult financial periods. The focus on 'TOGETHERNESS' provided by a wide community understanding of the Tidy Towns process offered a cohesive direction, motivation and stimulus to a small town dramatically affected by national economic downturns.

Life in a small town, such as Strokestown, has always been driven by relationships (family, social groups and business connections). Even in today's rapidly changing world, with international difficulties unfathomable to most, this viewpoint has not really changed and has, instead, adapted to welcome new challenges, new residents but still with 'COMMUNITY' at its heart.



A REQUEST FROM STROKESTOWN TIDY TOWNS GROUP: during 2022 Strokestown was announced as one of 26 towns included in the Government's 'Town Centre First' policy (https://www.gov.ie/en/publication/473d3-town-centre-first-policy/). This is designed to *"... proactively address the decline in the health of towns across* Ireland and support measures to regenerate and revitalise them ...". Locally, this is being overseen by Strokestown Town Team (of which Strokestown Tidy Towns Group) is an active member).

A set of plans and proposals have been formulated which clearly specify structural amendments to the streetscape, paving, design and layout of Bawn Street and a section of Church Street. These plans also provide suggestions and a proposed direction for considerations to change the layout and usage of lands adjoining Bridge Street and Elphin Street.







Bawn St Public Realm

- · Creation of a reimagined public realm scheme developed for Bawn St which will provide a visual and physical link to Strokestown Park House recognising the traditional/period character of the house and sympathetic to this in terms of lighting, street furniture, materiality and style.
- Space for events, festivals, markets and outdoor dining.
- Shared surface arrangements including redesigned formal off-street parking areas, recognising the need for safer vehicular and pedestrian ٠ movements
- Clear and appropriately sited public information and way-finding signage .
- Landscaping and street furniture
- Upgrading of all associated services and utilities ٠
- Address the function and form of the existing roundabout, associated crossing points, infrastructure and signage
- Creation of a "transition" between the new public realm on Bawn St and the existing Church St area.

As a team Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has been asked <u>NOT</u> to consider or implement community streetscape changes until the 'Town Centre First' project reaches a completed state.

WE REQUEST THAT OUR CATEGORY SCORE IS <u>not</u> detrimentally affected by this government-driven project.

Derelict Sites / Unoccupied Buildings:

During 2022/23 Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has been a driver of attempts to identify a suitable derelict site and / or unoccupied building within Strokestown to be renovated and retrofitted with the aim of providing a central meeting space / community area for local groups.

We have liaised extensively with Roscommon County Council in regard to:

- (i) JUNE 2022: the former Fire Station site (on Church Street) and submitted a Municipal District Fund application to organise a feasibility study. We have subsequently been notified by Roscommon County Council that this site has been allocated planning permission for other usage so we have been unsuccessful.
- (ii) DECEMBER 2022: the former Magnet Ballroom (on Elphin Street). This was identified as an ideal site for community requirements and, in association with Strokestown Town Team, we were hopeful of this becoming a successful project. Unfortunately, following a fire on site, this building is currently classified as unsafe to access. We remain in consultation with Roscommon County Council and hope that they do not allow this town-centre site to simply collapse into dereliction.

Public Spaces:

In the 12 months since our last Tidy Towns competition entry Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has commenced <u>a long-term plan</u> to renew, refresh and refurbish Strokestown Grotto and Shrine.

The Grotto, situated at the N5 junction with the R368, is one of a number of community-relevant historic sites within the Strokestown boundaries.

Historically, for a long period extending into the 1900s, the site was used as the community waste and rubbish tip! Thankfully, this is no longer the case and the Grotto is now a place for time with family, a place to meet and a place for quiet contemplation and reflection and is the location of the Shrine to Our Lady of Fátima, erected by local residents in honour of an much-loved School Principal.

(M1) AUGUST 2022: Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has completed a renovation of the Shrine area, improving an improved outlook to users and passers-by and making the area safer for all visitors. This has been positively received from residents of Strokestown, including from relatives of the families involved in the building of the structure

To further improve the safety of users we have also implemented a 'No Glass' protocol, asking that no glass-based votive offerings be left within the Shrine area.

(M2) APRIL 2023: Using a new 'one-person' street sweeper (specifically purchased by Strokestown Tidy Towns Group to be used across the community to improve the removal of street debris) we have completed a thorough weeding of existing pathways and seating / table areas. This has made a fantastic improvement to how the area appears to users (and those driving past the site).

(NI) NOVEMBER 2022: As a starting point for refreshing site awareness for locals and visitors, Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has mounted **'Welcome to** Strokestown Grotto' signs at the entrance.

(M3) APRIL 2023: Over recent weeks Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has been pleased to see the results of a partnership between Strokestown Town Team and Strokestown Mens' Shed. Situated at the junction of Church Street and Elphin Street, the town Tourist Kiosk has been poorly maintained for a number of years resulting in it looking dowdy and giving a poor impression of Strokestown. The renovation and repair work completed by the Mens' Shed has resulted in this kiosk now being restored to being a community asset.



(N3) Despite the restrictions resulting from the mentioned 'Town Centre First' project Strokestown Tidy Towns Group remains unwavering in our desire and intent to ensure community public spaces are *monitored, maintained and 'made good'*. For 2023 we are submitting funding bids to further develop this area with the aim of it becoming an <u>enhanced Strokestown asset</u>, increasing public footfall, ease of access, relevance to the Strokestown community and a <u>biodiversity hotspot</u>.

The attached image, and key, clearly show our intent for this historic area to offer an expanded function, supporting work being undertaken by other Strokestown groups (such as Womens' Shed, Green Hub Gardening Club, Brothers of Charity).

If suitably funded, our Grotto Improvement Plan will also result in the laying of new walkways improving safety and accessibility for all users.

It will also provide Strokestown with a Community Garden (to be maintained by the Green Hub Gardening Club) and a Sensory Garden which, we hope, will enhance the visitor experience, whether this be for local residents / users (such as the Brothers of Charity, located immediately adjacent to the Grotto) or external visitors.

7	Create two new openings linking to replacements for existing, unsuitable Grotto walkways (providing safer, user-friendly surfaces) directing users on a journey
2	around the site between the new openings, giving improved access to existing high-quality seating/tabled areas and enhancing accessibility for all.
3	Provide community partners (Green Hub Gardening Club, Strokestown Womens' Shed, The Brothers of Charity, Strokestown Mens' Shed) with site-specific areas
ð	enabling them to develop their own projects and endeavours.
4	Introduce a Community Garden into Strokestown, in conjunction with the Green Hub Gardening Club.
5	Develop a Sensory Garden, to be used by local residents, community groups and visitors to Strokestown.
6	Build additional bedding areas (and improve existing areas) providing Strokestown Tidy Towns Group and the Green Hub Gardening Club with the ability to continue
	ongoing town enhanced planting plans.
7	Enable Strokestown Tidy Towns Group to improve community bird and bat nesting ecosystem.

Green Spaces and Landscaping

(N3) Grotto Improvement Project

MAY 2023: Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has specific plans to develop the Strokestown Grotto to offer an expanded function, supporting work being undertaken by other Strokestown groups (such as Womens' Shed, Green Hub Gardening Club, Brothers of Charity). It will provide Strokestown with a Community Garden (to be maintained by the Green Hub Gardening Club) and a Sensory Garden which, we hope, will enhance the visitor experience, whether this be for local residents / users (such as the Brothers of Charity, located immediately adjacent to the Grotto) or external visitors.

(M3) Estates planting

ONGOING: Thanks to a group of talented residents a number of our community estates continue to provide a colourful outlook to the Strokestown community and visitors.

(M4) Tidy Towns sub-groups

ONGOING: We are blessed to have talented horticulturalists and gardeners as part of the wider Strokestown Tidy Towns Group. These individuals have come together to form a **'Planting Sub-Group'** and are taking the lead on planting across the community.

(N4) Community tree planting

FEBRUARY 2023: Thanks to donation of a number of fruit trees by Caseys Londis (Roscommon) Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has been able to undertake planting across the town, both in estates and on general sites. Whilst doing this we have used the knowledge and teaching skills of local expert, Hannah Mole from Earthcare Permaculture Ireland to provide guidance and support on correct tree care.

(N5) Ardcarne Garden Centre – future planned planting

ONGOING: Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has developed a close working relationship with <u>Ardcarne Garden Centre</u>, recognised as one of Ireland's marker leaders. Through this partnership we have begun to formulate a 'Community Planting Plan' designed to structure and plan our town's planting over coming years. This is an exciting scheme and we are looking forward to it progressing.





(N6) Planting in community spaces

JUNE 2023: Utilising monies received following successful funding applications for 2023 Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has purchased two large planters, made from recycled materials. These will be located in front of a large industrial building on Bridge Street with the aim of improving the view for people using the Grotto and for those passing through.

In addition to this we intend to relocate 2 existing planters from an unused town site and two multi-platform planters, currently unused on housing estates.

These planters will be planted with a selection of the fruit trees donated to us, along with perennial, colourful flowers.

(N7) 2023 planting

MARCH 2023: Using monies received following successful funding applications for 2023 Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has purchased 500 bulbs to provide summer colour across the community.

These bulbs have been shared with estates Residents' Associations to provide continuity of colour across Strokestown. Planting guidance and support is being provided by the Green Hub Gardening Club.

(M5) Community business planting

JULY 2023: Strokestown Tidy Towns Group is lucky to have the support of a number of established local businesses who, every year, and ensure that flowers planted outside of their establishments positively represents our community, both to other residents and businesses but also to those visiting or passing through.

(N8) Wildflower planting

JULY 2023: As a first for Strokestown, during 2022 Strokestown Tidy Towns Group sowed traditional, indigenous wildflower seeds into a number of community spaces including, after a period of consultation on Health Care Centre land owned by the HSE.

SEPTEMBER 2022: As part of the 2022 National Hedgehog Survey we partnered with the Green Hub Gardening Club to hold an information session run by experts from the national body. This event was well attended and an number of attendees subsequently took part in the survey process.

(N8) Wildflower seeding

JULY 2022: As a first for Strokestown, during 2022 Strokestown Tidy Towns Group sowed traditional, indigenous wildflower seeds into a number of community spaces, including Tower View, our Primary Care Centre and Strokestown Grotto.

(N3) Grotto Improvement Project

Famine Burial Ground (M9)

The Cloonslanor site is a famine burial ground sitting within a ringfort and is associated with the Workhouse in Strokestown. Historical records indicate that, under pressure from Poor Law Commissioners, a workhouse was constructed in 1851/1852 on a 13-acre site to the south-west of Strokestown.

The Burial Ground remains a reminder of a part of our community history and heritage, and Strokestown Tidy Towns Group is currently working on a project to develop this burial ground into an attractive area of remembrance. Future plans are to create a walking trail linking the Cloonslanor Burial Ground site with the National Famine Museum, Incated at Strokestown Park House.

As evidenced in the photographs below community support has been immense with key work being completed by a range of individuals and groups. Strokestown Tidy Towns Group has been astounded by this local backing. An especial mention must go to An Gaisce students from Scoil Mhuire, our local Secondary School, who are undertaking regular sitework.

The ongoing development of the Cloonslanor Burial Ground (promoted via Facebook, the Strokestown community website and the Strokestown Tidy Towns Group website) is a key way of linking our past heritage to that of our future and forms an essential part of our work.

The ongoing development of the Cloonslanor Burial Ground is managed as part of the Community Improvement Plan created and maintained by the Executive Committee of Strokestown Tidy Towns Group. Heritage support is provided by the Heritage Officer at Roscommon County Council.







Tidiness and Litter Control

AUGUST 2023: Big Poop Scoop project (N18)

Dog fouling is a problem affecting all communities. Strokestown Tidy Towns Group is working closely with 2 community businesses Laura's Canine Academy (a local kennels and animal training specialist) and Isle of Dogs (a local dog groomer) to try and educate dog owners in how to correctly care for their animals whilst helping keep Strokestown clear of dog waste. We have, additionally, arranged for the installation of Mutt Mitt dog waste bag holders in two sites.

(N19) FEBRUARY 2023: Council help

In August 2022 Strokestown Tidy Towns Group Chair and Treasurer met with the newly employed Roscommon County Council Municipal Engineer to raise concerns regarding the lack of community waste bins and the poor service being provided with regard to the frequency of visits by the Council street sweeper.

As a result of regular follow-up conversations we are extremely pleased to see the installation of 3 new waste bins and an increased frequency of street sweeper visits and we would like to place on record our appreciation of the support provided by the Municipal Engineer.

Residential Streets & Housing Areas

Residential streets that include Town Houses are integral parts of towns and villages and should be treated in a similar fashion to public and private housing developments. Consideration is given to proper presentation and maintenance of all properties with due cognisance given to maintenance of frontages, boundary and gable end walls. Gardens, where applicable, should be presented to a good standard. In housing developments green areas should be cut regularly. Children's play areas to be considered with equipment maintained to best standards. Where possible individual estates should have suitable name signs - stones, plaques, signposts, etc., preferably bilingual. This is designed to *"... proactively address the decline in the health of towns across Ireland and support measures to regenerate and revitalise them ..."*. Locally, this is being overseen by Strokestown Town Team (of which Strokestown Tidy Towns Group is an active member).

A set of plans and proposals have been formulated which clearly specify structural amendments to the streetscape, paving, design and layout of Strokestown all approach roads (Bridge Street, Church Road, Elphin Street and Bawn Street).

Bawn St Public Realm

- Creation of a reimagined public realm scheme developed for Bawn St which will provide a visual and physical link to Strokestown Park House recognising the traditional/period character of the house and sympathetic to this in terms of lighting, street furniture, materiality and style.
- Space for events, festivals, markets and outdoor dining.
- Shared surface arrangements including redesigned formal off-street parking areas, recognising the need for safer vehicular and pedestrian
 movements
- Clear and appropriately sited public information and way-finding signage
- Landscaping and street furniture
- Upgrading of all associated services and utilities
- · Address the function and form of the existing roundabout, associated crossing points, infrastructure and signage
- Creation of a "transition" between the new public realm on Bawn St and the existing Church St area.



- Please ensure you have included a map of your area and your TidyTowns 3/5 year plan with your entry.
